

T wenty years ago a group of local citizens including business people, parents and educators saw the need for more community connections and private relationships in support of the Ithaca City School District.

The Ithaca Public Education Initiative was incorporated as a not-for-profit with 501(c)(3) status in 1996 as a vehicle to facilitate access to our community's resources that can help ensure the success of district students. IPEI volunteers, board members and staff continue to support teachers and community members seeking to enhance the education of every student.

This mission remains manifest in IPEI's oldest program: Teacher Grants for individual teachers fund innovative educational projects that involve a community partner and that cannot be funded through tax dollars.

In addition, IPEI has sought to foster school and community connections by creating additional grant programs, collaborations, affiliates, and initiatives.

As IPEI turns 20, there is much to be proud of, and even more to look forward to as we continue to expand and improve our support for innovation and creativity.

Our third decade will engage a new generation of local volunteers and community partners to continue the mission by increasing opportunities throughout the ICSD.

Jennifer Engel was a member of the task force that became the first IPEI board, and she continues as an active volunteer and supporter. Reflecting on IPEI's evolution and its potential, she expressed, "The possibilities are endless! As IPEI turns 20, we can think about 'what's next?' and how to continue our role making sure that education in Ithaca is the very best it can be."

Between 1996 and 2016, IPEI made 1,700 grants and awards totaling approximately \$1.6 million, due to the community's generous support!

Grants 2015-16

IPEI awarded 88 Grants totaling \$62,374:

• 16 Teacher Grants totaling \$17,563

Teacher Grants provide up to \$1,500 for projects that fund teachers' great ideas involving community partners.

69 Red and Gold Grants totaling \$31,097

Red and Gold Grants are awards up to \$500 to teachers, staff, students or community members for projects that strengthen and enrich learning.

3 Connecting Classrooms Grants totaling \$13,714

Connecting Classrooms Grants encourage partnerships within and across Ithaca schools. They are funded by IPEI's Our Children*Our Schools*Our Future capital campaign.



Spelling Bee

More than 300 community members of all ages gathered for the 18th Annual IPEI Adult Spelling Bee on Sunday, March 6 in the Ithaca High School Wellness Center Gym. Due to the growing popularity of the event, the number of spelling bee teams competing for the championship Fuzzy Bee trophy grew to 32, up from 28 teams. Nearly \$30,000 was raised for IPEI grants for teachers from team entry fees, corporate and event sponsorships, a silent auction and quilt raffle. The event was IPEI's largest and

most successful Bee to date!

A new written word format (instead of the spoken word format of past Bees) was introduced and well-received by spellers, officials and audience members. The Spelling Bee was won by the IthacaSTEM Hexaplexes without a single misspelling.

Students at DeWitt Middle School participated in an interactive history program funded by an IPEI Red and Gold Grant titled "WWII: The U.S. Home Front". Social Studies teacher Pamela Engram took on the role of "Rosie the Riveter," the iconic character representing women who took jobs building bomber airplanes during WWII. She gave a "Rosie at Work" talk, set in San Diego's Consolidated Aircraft B-24 Liberator plant in the summer of 1943. The students, role-playing as reporters, asked "Rosie" questions about her job, and helped her rivet airplane parts. "My presentation was based on the actual experiences of many women who worked in what had been 'men's jobs' before the war,"

Engram said. She noted that students became familiar with the challenges facing women working during this period, such as pay differences between men and women as well as issues involving gender roles and identity.

Part two of the grant program included a "Rosie at Home" presentation, based on experiences typical of many in the United States during WWII. Students

learned about the shifting of household responsibilities, and wrote letters to a fictional soldier to help boost morale. The grant funds enabled Engram to purchase and display ration books, a blue star service flag, posters, and many other period artifacts.

"Without this two-day interactive lesson, it is very hard for students to understand the importance of the home effort, the key role that children and women played in winning the war, the major shift in gender roles, and the perceptions of African Americans that began with WWII," Engram said.

West African Musician

Connects Classrooms and Cultures

Students and teachers across the Ithaca City School District (ICSD) learned about West African culture, history, music and life through "Introduction to West African Drum and Dance," an IPEI Connecting Classrooms Grant. International community partner Sulley Imoro

led workshops in eight schools across multiple grade levels that focused on West African life, history and culture through traditional Ghanaian drum and dance practices.

Collaborating teachers gained the necessary resources and understanding to include an African drum and dance unit in their curriculum beyond this year in their "world



music" section of the arts curriculum. The program, centered on inclusion and community, impacted 800 students and concluded with a celebration concert supported by the Ithaca College Drum and Dance Ensemble.

"Students were enthralled at the music and stories that they could relate to and those that were new," said ICSD music teacher Jennifer Kivisild. "Many stepped up to dance or move, improvise in front of others, sing alone (some for the first time), and ask questions due to genuine interest. Overall, this was a fabulous cultural experience for students and attending adults and staff."




Kids Discover the Trail! Ithaca

KDT! Ithaca is a collaboration between IPEI, Ithaca City School District, and the Discovery Trail that gives every district student the opportunity to connect their learning to the rich experiences available through the eight Discovery Trail organizations during each year of elementary school. KDT! offers a one of a kind experience for elementary students through curricularly structured educational experiences to highly engaging destinations throughout the Ithaca region. These field experiences enhance childhood learning through hands-on, developmentally appropriate activities that promote cognitive, physical, and social-emotional growth.

In 2015-16, *KDT! Ithaca* provided field experiences to 2,777 ICSD students in 158 classrooms to the Discovery Trail's seven museums and the public library.

99% of teachers agree that *KDT!* enhances classroom learning through experience-based programs and with 100% participation of Pre-K to 5th grade classes, *KDT!* provides equal access to all Discovery Trail sites.

Fine Arts Booster Group

The Fine Arts Booster Group (FABG) believes the arts – music, dance and visual, literary and theater arts – are a central part of every child's public school education. FABG celebrates ICSD student learning in all the arts through grant support, scholarships, instrument recycling and communication.



In 2015-16, FABG supported 23 projects serving 2,855 students with \$8,391 in grants, communicated regularly with 230 listserv members, printed 9,625 performance event programs for the secondary schools, donated 23 recycled and repaired musical instruments and items, assisted 43 elementary students with instrument rental scholarships and five secondary students with instrumental trip scholarships, supported five teachers in arts residence with the Saltonstall Arts Colony partnership, organized more than 100 volunteers for the New York State School Music Association Solo and Ensemble Festival, and awarded \$12,124 in special grants to support students' arts learning.

IthacaSTEM Advocates

IthacaSTEM Advocates was founded in 2013 as an all-volunteer affiliate of IPEI. IthacaSTEM is devoted to fostering the appreciation, knowledge, and application of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) by encouraging involvement in STEM-related activities, clubs, teams, events, and classes in the ICSD. We also raise funds to improve learning opportunities in



STEM disciplines for all ICSD students, and work to facilitate collaboration across the community.

IthacaSTEM connected the Ithaca High School senior pre-engineering class with community mentors and brought in guest speakers to assist the students with their product development ideas. It culminated in a Pitch Night in which students had five minutes to pitch their ideas to a panel of judges to gain funding for the projects. One team, Hillside Hydro, was accepted into a summer business accelerator and plans to take their product to market.

Networking Night was expanded to become "Growing STEM in Ithaca". This spring event was held at Ithaca High School and showcased student groups, STEM-related local businesses and not-for-profits, and groups from Cornell and Ithaca College. Par-ticipants brought hands-on activities for middle and high school students to explore and pique their interest in pursuing STEM-related classes and/or careers.

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Pre-kindergarteners and kindergarteners danced, learned, and discovered their individuality through a program at Beverly J. Martin Elementary titled "Inside Outside Upside Down: Discovering the World through the Language of Dance." Funded through an IPEI Teacher Grant, this early childhood dance and literacy initiative combined movement, English, and the arts as a means to physically engage students with literature.

Led by community partner Lisa Tsetse, the eight-week program sought to foster the development of body awareness, cognitive movement, literacy, and music experience. Students engaged in various exercises and poses, exploring their emotional and physical development, as well as improving their spatial awareness.

"These dance art experiences emphasize physical awareness and language development in an effort to support students' motivation to read and express their knowledge using movement to stimulate whole brain and body engagement," said BJM teachers Sheri McWhorter-Wyckoff and Mary Anne Camel.

The program was especially meaningful for beginning ELL (English Language Learner) students, the teachers reported. "They could be as successful and involved as their English-speaking peers because the learning was so visual. The kinesthetic learning layered with language supported their acquisition of English as well."

"We got to observe our students from a new angle, and developed many of our own skills and understandings about how they can be engaged and empowered as learners," they added.

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
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
